Seventh in the long and illustrious line of Marine Corps Mascots, is Sergeant Jiggs VII presently stationed at Marine Corps Schools, Quantico, Virginia.

From the very beginning, there was something about the buildog, with its characteristic pugnacity, which won the hearts of Marines. They themselves, had been dubbed "Devildogs" by the Germans for the ferociousness they displayed at Belleau Wood and Chateau Thierry during World

It was only appropriate, therefore, that the Marine corps first official masset was Jiggs, buildog son of the famous Rob Roy, who enlisted as a private at Quantico on October 14, 1922. From that day to this, buildogs have served as morale boosters at almost every Leatherneck base in the country.

Each Jiggs is assigned a serial number and a service record book, in which his deeds, misdeeds, punishments, transfers, proficiency marks and conduct are entered.

Jiggs VII was born on January 6, 1955 and was presented to the Marine Corps by the Preston Engineering Company, St. Louis, Missouri. His service record shows he was enlisted as a private on November 9, 1958 at the age of ten months. He was promoted to private first class on September 16, 1966 and to Corporal on March 1, 1987. He achieved his present rank on the first day of March this year.

Fifty-four pounds of barking good nature, Jiggs VII boasts a clean record book as evidenced by his rapid promotion.



Quantico Football History

Football hindered by World War II, returned to Quantico in 1946 with the local gridders winning three of their eleven scheduled games.

The following year the story changed as the Marines smashed twelve of their thirteen opponents to register a .923 average for the season. In 1948 they bettered the previous year's record with thirteen straight victories.

1949 saw the Leathernecks with an 11-3 record and the following year they ompiled a 9-1 win-loss record.

The Korean Conflict in 1951 pulled Marine football prospects into combat and as a result that season showed Quantico with a .455 percentage record. 1952 proved to be a little better for the locals as they won eight while only losing three. The following year they won nine of their twelve games.

In 1954 ten opponents went down under Quantico's gridmen while losing only two for the season. The following year the Leathernecks compiled an 8-3 record and in 1956, 9-3.

Considering all factors, 1957 was the worst year in Quantico football history as the Marines dropped eight of their eleven games for a .273 average.

In 1958 the local gridmen began to climb back into service football prominence as they won nine of their twelve games and developed a promising outlook for the 1959 season.

1959 the Marines had their first undefeated season since 1948. The Leathernecks met ten season opponents, defeating them all before going on to win the All-Service Championship by downing McClelland Air Force Base 90-0 in the Seventh Annual Shrimp Bowl.

In 1960 the Marines compiled a 9-2 record, losing only to Xavier and Detroit Universities, before claiming their second All-Service title by defeating the Pensacola Goshawks in the 1st Annual Missile Bowl. They downed the San Diego Marines the following week to claim the All-Marine title,

Last year Quantico compiled a 9-4 record, losing to football powers Villanova and Baldwin Wallace Universities. Before seeing the longest win record in Service competition end at 21 wins, the Leathernecks were beaten by their brothers in arms, the Camp Lejeune Marines.

QUANTICO FOOTBALL HISTORY

Football, interrupted by World War II, returned to Quantico on a shaky basis in 1946. The Marine gridders won only three of eleven contests for a .273 percentage, the worst in Quantico football history.

The following year saw a complete reverse as the Marines overwhelmed 12 of 13 opponents and won both the Gator Bowl and the All-Navy Title.

Eager to re-establish their pre-war football prominence, the Virginia Leathernecks went undefeated in 13 games and captured, in 1948, their second straight All-Nayy title. The defense allowed only 49 points during the season and eight of the 13 opponents were held scoreless.

Quantico continued its winning ways in 1949, recording an 11-3 record and winning still another All-Navy title. During the season the Marines faced six college opponents, defeating Magara, Wayne, Virginia Tech, VMI and losing to Xavier and West Virginia.

BAINBRIDGE, Dick (End. 6-1, 200 lbs., Cettysburg College) Played four years of football at Gettysburg where he was also an honorable mention All-American increase player. His good speed and sure hands are a definite asset to the Quantico squad.

BEERY, Jim (Center, 6-2, 205 lbs., Harvard University) Lettered in foot-ball at Harvard and received the coveted LeCroix award for his gridiron exploits. Also played basketbail and rugby. First class performer.

BRAUCH, Herm (Fullback, 6-0, 220 lbs., Colgate Univ.) The pile-driving fullback was the bread 'n butter man in the Quantico backfield last year. Improved speed and weightlifting during the off season are expected to make the former Colgate star an even greater threat this year.

CLANCY, John (Halfhack, 5-10, 185 lbs., The Citadel) John held down a halfback position on the '62 squad after starring at the Citadel for 3 years. His strong running and breaksway ability add impetus to the Quantico backfield.

COE, Charles (Tackle, 6-3, 215 lbs., Brown University) The newcomer played 4 years of football at Brown where he was also New England AAU runner-up in heavyweight wrestling in 1958. Has good speed for a big man.

CUTTING, Hank (Halfback, 6-2, 200 lbs., Holy Crosa) Was a big gun in the Crusaders' backfield before graduating the beginning of this year. Uses his big frame to best advantage when toting the pigskin and figures prominently in the Marines '63 plans.

DAVIS, Jim (Center, 5-11, 220 lbs., Oklahoma University) The former All Big Eljáh selection with the Sooners ranks as one of the most important liaemen on the Marine squad. He was Quantico's starting center last year and handies all the place-kicking chores. The native Texan poses a field goal threat anywhere within the 55-yard line.

ECKERT, Ron (Guard, 5-9, 200 lbs., Upsala College) One of the most welcome newcomers, Ron was a high school All-American in Rhode Island and a Little All-American at Upsala. He is equally effective on both, offense and defense.

EILERS, Joe (Tackle, 6-1, 230 lbs., Texas A&M) The one year veteran of Marine ball was voted Texas A&M's best lineman two years in succession and named to the All-Southern Conference team during the same span. He was a key figure in last year's outstanding line.

EVERETT, Jack (Guard, 5-10, 210, Arkansas State) Another returning starter for the Marines, Jack played three years at Arkansas State. His presence gives Quantico good protection in the center of the line.

FINIZIO, Frank (Fullback, 5-8, 193 lbs., University of Rhode Island). Very deceptive in size, the harrel-chested fullback romped to All-Yankee Conference honors at Rhode Island. The three-year letterman was co-captain of his 1962 college squad.

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GOTARD, Hank (Tackle, 6-3, 240 lbs., Villanova Univ.) "Tiny" saw four years of action with Villanova and was signed by the Denver Broncos in 1961. He is especially rugged on defense and carries his weight easily.

GUTTER, John (Guard, 5-10, 190 lbs., Univ. of Rhode Island) Gained Ali-Yankee Conference, All-New England and honorable mention All-American at Rhode Island in 1962. He is one of several good "little" men at the Marine guard slots.

HATCHER, Bill (Tackle, 6-1, 220 lbs., Service Ball) Billy played at Virginia Tech and Parris Island from 1959 through 1960 and was one of the mainstays for the Camp Lejeune Marines last year. The newcomer brings strength to the tackle slots.

HAYES, Dave (Fullback, 6-3, 215 lbs., Penn State). The piston-legged full-back was the eight draft choice of the Baltimore Colts while performing on the Nittany Lion campus. He was a high-school honorable mention All-American in Bellimore, N. Y., and also participates in wrestling and track.

HUFFMAN, Jay (Guard, 6-1, 210 lbs., Penn State) Gained All-East and honorable mention All-American honors at Penn State in 1961. A defensive specialist, he is another of the great linebacks for which the Marines are noted.

KILLIAN, Billy (Halfback, 6-1, 170 lbs., Service Ball) The newcomer gained All-City honors at Huntsville, Alabama, where he also starred in basketball, track and baseball. Offsets his lack of weight with good speed and good moves.

KNOTT, Larry (End. 6-3, 210 lbs., Western Colorado) Larry was an all-conference selection in both high school and college and has improved himself considerably with weightliffing during the past year. Has the potential to be a front-liner and can play both offense and defense.

LOMBARDO, George (Tackle, 6-1, 220 lbs., Boston University) Played one year at Michigan State and three years at Boston Univ. before coming to the Marines this year. The newcomer has demonstrated provess on offense and rates among the better defenders.

McCARTHY, Pat (Quarterback, 6-1, 195 lbs., Holy Cross) The honorable mention All-American was possibly the greatest quarterback ever groomed by Dr. Eddie Anderson at Holy Cross. Also attained All-East and All New England bonors and was the recipient of the Bulger Lowe Award, presented to the outstanding intercollegiste footfall player in New England.

McKIBBAN, Darrell (Quarterback, 6-0, 190 lbs., University of Redlands). One of the four top-notch passers on the '63 Marine squad, the newcomer saw four years of action at Redlands. During his sophomore year in college, he completed 75% of his passes attempted and has thrown 4 TD passes in one game.

McNITT, John (Halfback, 6-0, 185 lbs., New Mexico University) Was named most valuable defensive player and co-captain during his four years of action with the Lobos. The defensive halfback is hard to fool and is one of the reasons that the Marine secondary is greatly improved this year.

MILTON, Dolph (Guard, 6-0, 205 lbs., Service Ball) An amazing performer considering his lack of college experience, Dolph is beginning his fourth year as a potential starter at Quantico. He never played football before entering the Marines but is one of the squad's toughest defenders and rated a good bet for hig-time college ball.

MUDD, Dennis (Wingback, 6-1, 225 ibs., St. Joseph's College of Indiana) The big back was co-captain and most valuable player on his college squad in 1962 and looked very promising during August workouts. He is an exceptional blocker and destined to see alot of action this fail.

OPTEKAR, Pete (Guard, 5-10, 200 ibs., U. S. Naval Academy) Pete is an ex-Marine buck sergeant who had never played football before entering the Naval Academy. He played 4 years at Annapois, broke into the starting line-up as a Junior, and was named outstanding lineman in both the Notre Dame and Boston College games during his Senior year. The newcomer also participated in horroses and was an outstanding boxer chring his collegate days.

O'ROURKE, Tom (Halfback, 5-10, 185 lbs., Villanova University) Tom is another Villanova product, now with the Marines, who signed a contract with the Denver Bronos in 1961. A defensive specialist, he was among the nations's leaders in pass interceptions in 1960 and was named "college player of the week" in September 1961.

ROCKSTAD, Dick (End, 6-5, 225 lbs., Lewis & Clark College) "Rocky" saw four years of college action, gaining all-conference honors and also starring in track. The Portland, Oregon product is a hard man to defend against on passes.

ROSS, Jim (End, 5-6, 165 lbs., Service Bail) After three years of action at the halfback slot with the local gridders, Jim has been moved to end and the results look favorable. The turbo-legged speedster has a pair of sure hands and is very clusive. He is a big sports figure on the post, participating in intramural baselsthall and softball.

SINGLETON, Tom (Quarterback, 6-1, 205 lbs., Yale University) Tom beat out former Buckneil Little All-American Paul Teheres for a starting role with the Marines last year and won the team's most valuable back award. A tough competitor with lots of savvy, be gained All-New England and All-East honors with the Eli and was one of the best quarterbacks developed at Yale.

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STANAT, Chris (Wingback, 6-0, 200 lbs., U. S. Military Academy) The former West Pointer did a commendable job at fullback position for the Marines lasty sear and is expected to star in his new role as wingback. A good blocker and runner, he saw four years of action at the Academy and halls from nearby Washington, D. (1)

TURKALO, Steve (Guard, 6-0, 210 lbs., Boston University). An All-County selection for 3 years in high school, "Turk" went on to star at Boston Univ.. The 210 pounder is one of two members of last year's BU squad now with the Marines

URITUS, Ted (End, 6-1, 205 lbs., John Carroll Univ.) Ted was named to the all conference team two years in succession while playing for John Carroll. The talented end looms as one of the better receivers on the '63 squad and is a good defender and blocker.

WALLACE, Jack (Quarterback, 6-3, 220 lbs., Ohio State) Jack was one of the most highly-touted players during the August tryouts, excelling as a runner, passer and defender. Before playing four years with the Buckeyes, he attained high school All-American Defensive Team.

WAYNE, Tony (End, 5-7, 165 lbs., Penn State) "Mad Anthony" is the fastest man on the squad, and saw alot of action at the halfback slot for the Marines last year after 4 years of experience with the Nithany Lions. The speed merchant is ideally-suited for his new end position and is expected to be one of the prime targets of the Marine passers.

WHALEN, John (Tackle, 6-1, 215 lbs., Holy Cross) John was a Catholic All-American and All-East selection with the Crusaders in 1961. The rugged lineman is a strong defender and blocker. Also captain of lacrosse team at Holy Cross.

WYDO, Mike (Guard, 5-10, 190 lbs., St. Vincent's College) Mike was an all-conference selection for 3 years and All-Pennsylvania one year at St. Vincent's. Also captain of his college squad in 1962 and plays both guard and linebacker positions.

ZADJEIKA, George (End, 6-2, 205 lbs., Service Ball) "Zeke" is in his 3rd year with the Quantico Marines and was named to the Leatherneck All-Marine squad in 1981, when he played in the Missile Bowl. He has never played any varsity college ball but has gifted bands and good running and blocking have attracted college scholarship offers.

The following year the high-flying Marine gridders compiled a 9-1 record against what was probably their toughest schedules. Eight of their 10 opponents were college teams. Included among the victories was a 55-0 thumping of the Bolling Air Force Base, one of Quantico's bitterest rivals during the early 50's.

Despite the crippling defect of the Korean Conflict in 1951, Quantico was able to field a football team and finished the season with a 5-6 record. The first meeting between Quantico and Holy Cross was in this year, a team that the Leathernecks renew their rivalry with this year, after an interim of five years.

The next two seasons the Marines quickly regained their winning form, reording an 8-3 mark in 1952 and a 9-3 mark in 1963. Over the span Quantico defeated Fordham University, split two games with powerful Bolling and twice defeated both Xavier and Holy Cross.

From 1954-1956, the Marine grid teams racked up 27 wins against 8 losses. 1954 showed the best won-lost record, of the span 10-2, and marked the first meeting between Quantico and Detroit University, Quantico won the opener, 20-0. The Marines and Boston College met for the first time during the 1956 season. In 1857 the Leathernecks slipped to 8-36-1 season, their second worst, but rebounded sharply with a 9-3-1 record in 1856. The latter year Quantico played Villanova and Rutgers for the first time, defenting both by narrow marginas.

The year 1959 was not only an undefeated one (11-0) for the Marines, but one in which they gained undisputed possession of the National Service crown. Quantice won over its ten regular season opponents and went on to cop the service title by defeating McClellan Air Force Base 90-0 in the Seventh Annual Shrimp Bowl. in 1960, the Marines completed a 9-2 record, losing only to Xavier and Detroit Universities, before claiming their second straight Ail-Service Title by defeating the Pensacola Coshawks 36-6 in the 1st Annual Missile Bowl. They downed the San Diego Marines the following week to claim the Ail-Marine Title.


Quantico compiled a 9-4 record during the 1961 season, including losses to Vilhanova and Baldwin Wallace. Before seeing the longest win record in service competition end at 21 wins, the Leathernecks were beaten by their brothers in arms, the Camp Lejeune Marines.

Last year Quantico racked up a 5-2 record before football was officially cancelled here on October 5th, because of the Cuban crisis. The losses came at the bands of Miami of Ohio, upset winner over Purdue, and undefeated Fort Benning.
